The history of Haiti is filled with political corruption. December 16, 1990, to the euphoria of the people, a democratic election took place. The people danced in the streets. A former Roman Catholic priest, Jean Bertrand Aristide, was elected president of Haiti for 5 years.

We do not know the abilities of President Aristide to govern a nation, especially a nation riddled with problems. However, this new president deserves our prayers and support. We trust that this will be a new day for Haiti, and that now with a duly-elected president, the country will begin to find direction and experience some improvement.

COME SEE ME

Often when a missionary is talking with a Haitian child, the subject will turn to the child's American sponsor. The children want to know about the person helping them go to the mission school. They ask, "What is their name? Where do they live? Will they ever come to see me?"

One of the great experiences of life is for a sponsor to come to our mission in Haiti, to see the work God is doing and to spend time visiting in the home of the child they sponsor. This is also an indescribable time for the sponsored child. The child feels very special and finds great joy and support to personally meet their sponsor from the U.S. Perhaps, God will allow you to come to Haiti one day.

MISSION NEWS

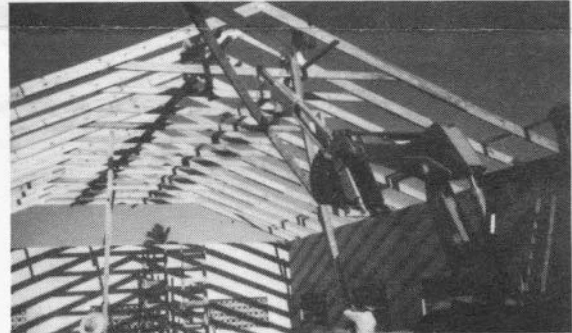
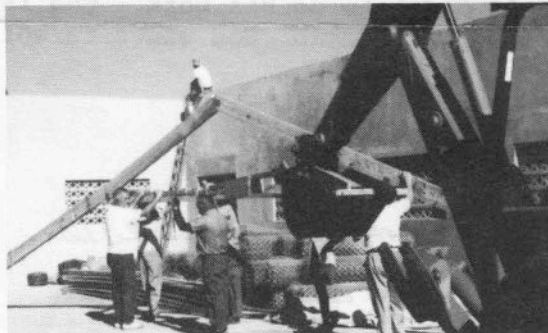

Jenny then laid hands on each of the family members, praying that the blindness that had cursed the family for so many years would be gone. She prayed that the restoration which comes with the Gospel would come upon them. Immediately, the family members began to see. Needless to say the missionaries returned to the mission rejoicing in what the Lord had done.

Dear Friends of Haiti,

"MY SISTER, SHE'S HUNGRY TOO."

A young girl, 9 or 10 years old, riding a horse, came by the mission at Bord Mer. She stopped her horse in front of me, patted her stomach and said, "Pastor, I'm hungry." I shrugged the girl off. A short while later, I was standing near the stream that runs through our mission, talking to another missionary, and the same girl was standing on the bridge that crosses the stream, not saying a word, her eyes fixed on me. I said to the missionary. "She's hungry." I remembered that at my home was the remains of lunch, a full bowl of rice and beans with sauce.

I invited the girl to my house. She sat outdoors at the table and I gave her the bowl of rice and beans. She sat, looked at the food and then looked out to the fence that surrounds the mission. "My sister," she said, "she's hungry too." The girl would not eat until her little sister was invited in and together they shared the bowl of rice and beans.

To many of us, God as it were, has given us a full bowl. Will you share your bowl with your brother?

MISSION NEWS

BIBLE SCHOOL--Along with the 3 Bible courses being taught in Signeau, two new courses are being taught at the Bord Mer school. George DeTellis is teaching Bible Doctrine and Bob West is teaching English.

LASALLE AND BIREY--The churches of LaSalle and Birey had a week of special meetings during the month of February. Five young people accepted the Lord in Birey and were baptised in water on the last day of the revival. One of the young men, Cadet Louis, has shown a rebellious attitude for years and was hard to the Gospel. He said in his testimony in church, "No one in the village believes I'm saved, yet I know what God has done for me and I'm determined to live for Jesus." God has promised that His Word would bring forth a harvest.

HELP US GIVE BIBLES--Help us give Bibles to the students of our schools. We would like all of our students to receive a full Bible in the Creole language. The children of the mission are receiving an education and are able to read. It is important that every child have their very own copy of the Bible. While they are young, we need to hide God's Word in their hearts. If you would like to help to purchase Bibles, include an offering with this month's envelope.

CONVENTION REPORT

The last week of January, New Missions had their first church convention. The twelve churches of the mission came together in worship and to hear God's Word. Pastor Bart Pierce and his wife Coralee from the Rock Church in Baltimore, Maryland, were with us for the convention.

Pastor Bart preached powerfully each night. The people sang and danced before the Lord. The attendance the last night was 650 people inside the building and at least an additional 200 people outside. During the convention, 21 people who recently received the Lord were baptised in water. The Lord willing, the convention will become an annual event.

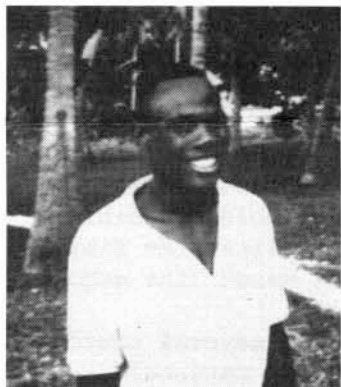

When NEW Missions came to Haiti, Jean Arnold Guy was 14 years old. Arnold was one of our first students and has been with us since the mission began. He started in our mission school at the third grade and is now a young man, 22 years old, in the third year of high school. Arnold has always been at the top of his class.

Two nights a week, Arnold attends our Bible School, where he is studying Bible Doctrine, Homiletics and English. He is a faithful member of Bord Mer Church and plans to be a Pastor upon finishing school. Arnold is fluent in English and helps in translating for new missionaries.

For the past 8 years, Arnold has been faithfully sponsored by Pastor Nick and Cheryl Zaccardi at First Baptist Church in Watertown, Massachusetts. God bless you Nick and Cheryl. Arnold's life has been changed!

HIGH SCHOOL TRADE COURSES

One of our long-term goals at NEW Missions is to offer practical courses at our High School that will prepare our young people for employment upon graduation. Some of our course interests are masonry, carpentry, cabinetmaking, welding, bookkeeping, typing and computer science.

We would like to begin teaching typing and word processing as soon as possible. There are foreign agencies in the capital city of Port-au-Prince who are in need of people proficient in typing and word-processing. As soon as we can set up a classroom with typewriters and computers, we will begin teaching.

Please believe God with us for 15 typewriters and 15 computers. Also, pray for a teacher who will dedicate his or her talents in training Haitian youth.

MISSION NEWS

PRIMARY SCHOOL AT BORD MER - This school is now enclosed by a chain-link fence. There were many people going through the schoolyard while school was in session and the students were being distracted. There are 600 students at the Bord Mer school. It is the largest of our 12 primary schools. The school directors, teachers and students are all pleased at the improved orderly environment provided by the fencing.

HIGH SCHOOL AND BIBLE COLLEGE

60 KW GENERATOR - We recently had three engineers install our 60 KW generator at the High School and Bible College. Bud Benson, a civil engineer came to NEW Missions for one week along with David Breton, an electrical engineer. These two men worked with Danny Hitchcock, a civil engineer who is with us at NEW Missions for one year. The existing buildings have been wired for electricity and an over-all plan has been established for providing electricity to other buildings in the future.

BUILDINGS PAINTED - All of the buildings at the High School and Bible College have been painted. We are now pouring concrete to finish the walkway that runs the length of the property and the front parking area.

LANDSCAPING - Dave Brunner from Come Alive Ministries in Medford, New Jersey, spent the last month doing landscaping at our High School and Bible College. Dave is a professional landscaper and has helped to beautify this property.

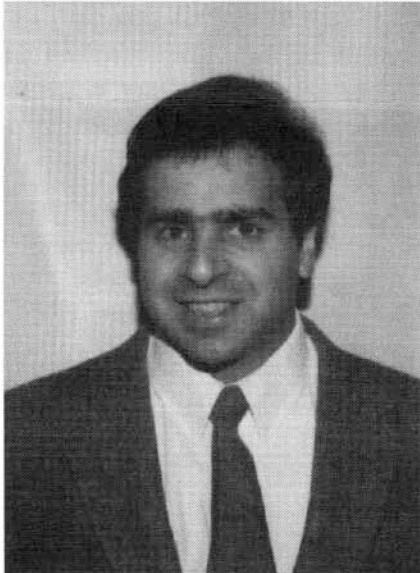

After an early breakfast, at 6:15 a.m., we pray and study God's Word together before going off to our various responsibilities. During our times together we enjoy hearing informal reports of ministry that takes place in the different villages. Linda Woodson told the following:

On the way to teaching a Bible Study in the village of Masson, Linda picked up two teenage boys from the village of Neply and took them with her. Her lesson that day was "The Power of His Name." After the lesson, Linda gave an invitation and both young men received the Lord.

The following week, three teenage girls came to the Bible Study for the first time. This time Linda spoke on "Trusting the Lord; He Is The Great I Am." All three girls accepted Jesus into their lives. Ministry such as this is taking place every day. The Holy Ghost is at work. Haitians are coming to faith in Jesus Christ.-- Linda Woodson is from Word Ministry Christian Outreach Center in Harrisonburg, Virginia.

MISSION NEWS

On April 6th and 7th, the film, "Jesus" was shown at our church in Signeau. The film is based on the Gospel of Luke and is in the Creole language. The Haitians loved the film. Great cheers went up when Peter and John cast their nets and filled their boat with fish. Every time someone was healed, the people clapped and cheered. At the victory of Jesus over death, the people were overjoyed. Over 600 people filled the church. For many this is the only film they have ever seen.

The Haitian people are very spiritual. They believe in two worlds; one natural, and the other spiritual. The people of Haiti readily respond to the Gospel. Haiti is God's fertile land.

MISSIONARY NEWS

BLAIR AND JOLENE WAGNER fulfilled a 3-month term of service on May 6th. Blair was in Haiti last year for 3 months. This year Blair came to Haiti with his new bride, Jolene. HAITIAN POLITICAL UPDATE

Often during an election, a candidate makes promises that he later cannot fulfill. Jean Bertrand Aristide, the new president of Haiti, promised to bring down the price of goods in the country, especially food. He also promised to increase wages. Instead, the cost of everything has gone up, wages remain the same, and unemployment is at an all-time high.

The poor people of Haiti are for Aristide, believing that in him they have found a man who is for the common person. The middle and upper classes are not content with the leadership of the new president. The country is divided. Personally, I believe that Aristide is an honest man who genuinely wants to bring positive change to Haiti. The question that remains is can this new president lead a country riddled with immense problems.

PUT OUT TO DIE

The Sunday service was over at the Bord Mer church and the preacher invited us to kneel and pray. In front of me a young girl Myrtha, 13 years old, began laying hands on the heads of several other young girls and with great earnestness prayed for them. My heart was touched for I knew that when Myrtha was a baby, she was very sick. The large family of nine had exhausted their resources and had no money for doctors or medicine. The child was put out to die. Unexpectedly, a relative came by to visit and found the child and provided help.



WHEN WILL I GO TO SCHOOL

There is a stream that separates our main mission from the Missions Training Center. Everyday I cross this stream by way of a footbridge. There at the stream a young girl often comes to wash clothes. This young girl always looks up at me and asks, "Pastor George, when will I go to school?"

The young girl is Vessia Louis. Vessia is 15 years old and has never been to school. She moved into our area from a village called Achaie which is across the bay from our mission. Vessia comes from a family that is "dirt poor" living in a grass hut, squatting on government land. Vessia cannot read or write. She is not enrolled in our school but Vessia comes to our school to eat each day with the school children.

This summer we are beginning a special literacy class for Vessia and several children like her. "Pastor George, when will I go to school?" Vessia, you are going to school this summer.

MISSIONARIES FOR ONE WEEK

Four young women were recently with us in Haiti: Cindy Ehrhardt, Deborah Olson and Davida Console from Windsor Locks, Connecticut; and Sandra Orsino from Oil City, Pennsylvania.

These girls ministered in different villages and made friends with the Haitian people. These were some of their comments:

CINDY - "I had \$30 in an envelope and I wanted to bless someone with this gift. When I went into the school fellowship, a small child ran into my arms, hugged me, and would not let me go. I gave the girl the envelope and later learned that she came from a poor Christian family in the small village by the mission. What a joy it is to give."

DAVIDA - "I crossed a stream walking on a log and met Fegus, nicknamed 'Ti Do Do'. He was in the mission school but was without a sponsor. Fegus is now my child. He is 6 years old. The joy is inexpressible."

DEBORAH - "This week was a week never to be forgotten. I feel like I was living the Book of Acts."

SANDRA - "The children ran to me, dozens, holding my hands. They loved me."

DIANA - "I met a Haitian teenage girl who said, 'I will never forget you.'"


Haiti has a way of reaching into your heart and never letting go.

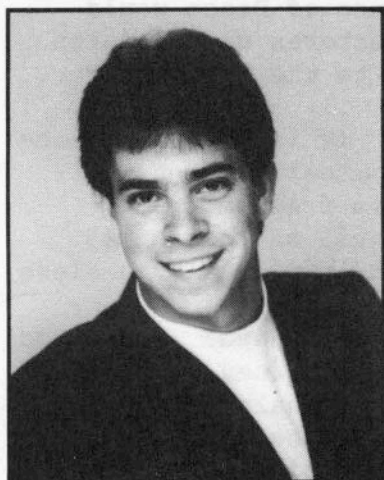

WORK PROJECT

A "Machanste" is a street seller in Haiti. One day four of our teenage girls asked if I wouldn't help them get started selling "rad Kennedy" (used clothing). Bales of used clothing are shipped to Haiti from the United States and then sold on the streets to the poor people for small amounts of money.

Mirogoane is one of the towns where ships come with goods to Haiti. Together, the four girls, two of their parents and I went to Miragoane. There I bought rice for our school children and two bails of clothes for the teenage girls to sell. The next day the girls were going from village to village selling their wares, earning some money to help themselves and support their families.

Timothy DeTellis was a missionary with his parents in Haiti for four years. Currently, he is in college full time. Tim is a contemporary christian artist and has come out with his first cassette album entitled, "Continue On." Tim often speaks to youth groups and represents NEW Missions. THE KINGDOM IS SHALOM



SUMMER ON THE MISSION FIELD

SCHOOL KITCHEN: The roof on the school kitchen will be changed. It is now a shed roof. The roof will be gabled, making it higher and therefore cooler. We will also have an overhang by the windows where the children pick up their food. This will provide more shade.

A WIDOW: A tin roof was put on the house of a widow woman.

MISSION: Forty of our Haitian young people have gone on a 5-day mission trip to the town of Cayes which is across the southern peninsula on the Caribbean Sea. The young people will be staying at another mission in Cayes and each day they will be out preaching and sharing their faith with other Haitians. Two of our American missionaries are with this mission team, Linwood Rideout and Dee Dee Rasmussen.

BORD MER: The thatched roof on the chacocon has been replaced with new grass.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL: The three school buildings at the main mission have been painted—the inside is white and the outside is a pretty pastel coral.

SUMMER EMPLOYMENT: We have over 200 young people at the mission asking for summer employment. For \$20 you can give a Haitian teenager a week's work. With this money they are able to buy the things they need to go back to school, such as clothing, accessories and notebooks. If you would like to help, you may send an offering for this purpose and indicate it on your return envelope.

SUMMER SCHOOL: During the summer, classes are being held at the main mission for grades 1, 2, and 3. This is to give our children extra time in school and prepare them to have a good school year.

LITERACY: A special literacy class is being held for children who have moved into our area who have never been to school. The basics—reading, writing and math are being taught.

TEACHER TRAINING: The first week of August, a training program will take place to train Haitian workers to do child evangelism.

FEEDINGS: Over a ton of food was given to children in TiRiviere. We are believing for more food supplies for us to continue food distribution over the summer months.

Our son Charles graduated from Columbia Bible College on June 1st of this year. While Charles was in school he met Rachel Gillette. Two weeks after graduation, Charles and Rachel were married and on July 3rd, Charles and Rachel came to Haiti to serve the Lord as missionaries.

Our son Charles has been preaching and teaching in Haiti and helping us with the overall function of the mission. This past week he put in a road for the Haitian people that will help them transport goods, such as sugarcane, to the ocean-front. It will also help them receive some goods, such as charcoal. The community was happy to see this project done quickly with the help of our tractor.

Our new daughter-in-law Rachel is helping at our clinic. In the past Rachel worked as a physical therapist. The clinic requires paperwork to be filed with the Haitian government and Rachel is overseeing that reporting. The clinic staff includes a Haitian doctor, nurse, receptionist and pharmacist. There are two medical clinic days besides prenatal, postnatal and family planning clinics. Devotions are held for the patients each day. Some older, malnourished folks have been coming to the clinic. Rachel has been ministering to them and gifting them with food.

VANT PLEN (full stomach)

'Vamt plen' is a common expression in Haiti to describe that you ate enough to feel 'full'. Most Haitians do not have enough daily food to have a full stomach. It is always a joy at our school feedings to see the children with a big bowl of food in front of them. We know that our God gives in abundance. God gives 'vant plen'. He is El Shaddai, the God that is more than enough. He gives us life and life abundantly. This school year we are looking to God and His people to help us provide food supplies for our 3000 children. We are believing God for the best year ever.

MISSION NEWS

CONCRETE BRIDGE—A concrete bridge has been built over the stream separating the main mission from our training center. Our vehicles were experiencing brake problems due to driving through the stream so often. Dan Hitchcock was the designer and supervisor of this project.

WOMEN'S TRAINING SEMINAR—The first weekend in August, a training seminar was held for Pastor's wives and women in leadership at our training center. Jeanne DeTellis led the seminar and was assisted by Mary Jane Basel, Joann West and Kelli Nelson. The women who attended were thankful that their minds were expanded to minister to the women of Haiti. Some of them said, for them, "Living at the mission was like taking a trip to Miami."

SUMMER SCHOOL—A summer school has been taking place at the mission. The school was started with four classes and has now increased to six. The Lord willing we'll have a summer school for more of our classes next year.

CHILD EVANGELISM TRAINING—A week of training in Child Evangelism took place the last week of July for the Haitian church workers. There were 70 in attendance. Many of our mission team were involved in the teaching.

MISSIONARY NEWS

BOB AND JOANN WEST—Bob and Joann had a furlough the month of August and are returning to Haiti September 3rd for their second year of missionary service. They are a gift to us from Rock Church in Baltimore, Maryland. Bob is working at the High School and Bible College and Joann is working as School Secretary for our 12 primary schools.

MARY JANE BASEL—Mary Jane spent the summer in Haiti, is home for a few weeks, and will be returning to NEW Missions in October. Mary Jane excels in Administration. She will be responsible for our Primary Schools.

BILL SIMMONS—Bill came to us from Faith Christian Center in Columbus, Ohio. He finished his first four-month term, doing a great job working among the Haitians and with our team.

VICKI VAZQUEZ—Vicki finished her first term of 14 weeks. Vicki worked in the clinic and was a good team player.

SUMMER MISSIONARY—Lisa Weiss from South Coast Community Church finished a 6-week term in Haiti. Lisa assisted in gift giving with the school children, letterwriting, and teaching in our summer school.



MISSIONARIES NEEDED FOR THE FIELD

The mission in Haiti needs missionaries to begin serving in the following staff positions:

DIRECTOR OF CHILD SPONSORSHIP-
Working in the mission office in Haiti overseeing correspondence between 3000 children and their U.S. sponsors, including distribution of birthday and Christmas gifts to children.

DIRECTOR OF SCHOOL KITCHEN-
Responsibilities to include; overseeing a team of Haitian staff that prepare and distribute food to school children in 12 locations, and purchasing and warehousing food on a daily basis.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS TRAINING CENTER- Responsibilities to include; hosting short-term mission teams twice monthly, providing hospitality and directing activities for incoming short-term visitors-including work projects, visiting village ministries, and day trips to other parts of the island.

CONSTRUCTION SUPERVISOR- Person to oversee the ongoing construction of schools and churches throughout the Leogane Plain. Responsibilities include; materials purchasing, site planning and managing construction workers.

MEDICAL PERSONNEL- RN, LPN to work in the mission clinic overseeing, prenatal, post-natal, family planning and general clinics.

A SOCCER FIELD FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL

Soccer "Football" is the national sport in Haiti. Throughout Haiti you will see youth and children kicking every imaginable homemade ball hoping some day to be good enough to be on a team. NEW Missions has purchased a parcel of land which is approximately 1-1/2 acres, directly behind the high school. This property will be developed as a soccer field for our students.

A PERSECUTED DAUGHTER

Five young people were baptised in water on August 25th. The next day, some of our high school students were on their way to work at a summer work project. A teenage girl named Rose told the group how her father became very angry with her for becoming a Christian. When she told him about her baptism, he put her out of the house. Many of our young people have been ill-treated for their stand for Jesus Christ.

GOD USES A FLAT TIRE

On Saturday August 24th, we brought a group of visitors to Tiano Beach for a day of relaxation. While driving back to the Mission on the highway one of our vans had a blow-out. The other three vehicles immediately stopped to help the driver of the van change the tire.

We heard Christian music a short distance away. I presumed there was a church service in progress nearby. I realized that I had a little time while the tire was being changed, so I decided to take a walk to find the church. I came upon a Haitian church with its doors wide open, and a choir rehearsing inside. The rest of our group soon joined me as we sat and listened to the choir sing their inspired music. After a couple of songs I realized that my wife, who was back at the mission, would soon become concerned of our whereabouts. I decided to send one of the vehicles on ahead.

While I was leaving the church I encountered a group of women walking down the path leading to the highway. I greeted them, and noticed that one of the women was in great pain. She began screaming as she walked, while the other women held her arms to support her.

"What is her problem?" I asked.

"She's about to have a baby." they answered. "She wants to get to the hospital in Leogane. Will you help?"


I quickly brought our Ford pickup truck over to get the woman. Two of her friends and some of our American visitors helped her into the truck. They laid her on a mat and rode with her on the way to the hospital. Just three weeks ago another woman delivered a baby girl in the back of my truck on the way to the hospital. I thought "Oh, Lord, here we go again." We were able to make it to hospital this time.

I am convinced that this woman was praying, "Lord, please get me to the hospital. I don't know how I will get there. Lord, you work it out." God did work it out. In His providence and love He saw to it that we got a blowout at the precise spot where she would reach the highway. Everyone in the group saw the hand of God in the circumstances of the day, and how God had provided safe transportation for this woman to the hospital. POLITICAL UPDATE

On February 6th of this year, Jean Bertrand Aristide, a Roman Catholic priest was inaugurated as president of Haiti. He was duly elected by 67% of the vote of the people. On September 30th, a military coup d'etat took place and President Aristide was exiled to the country of Venezuela. The coup represents a long class struggle between the poor and the upper ruling class in Haiti.

There must be some proper distribution of the wealth of a nation, the opportunity for the poor to share in the government and the means to improve their status in life. In Haiti, unlike America, the poor are the majority. They have been powerless to affect change but had found a champion in President Aristide. This class struggle has been going on for years and probably will not be resolved quickly.

Pray for Haiti. The world is changing and Haiti needs to become part of the positive changes that are taking place without violence. Reasonable men need to negotiate their differences peaceably.

NEW MISSIONS VISION

New Missions does not get involved in political disputes. Our purpose is to bring the gospel of Jesus Christ to the people of the Leogane Plain and through them to all the people of Haiti. We are planting churches, providing schools, meeting medical needs, feeding children, and bringing hope to a land filled with despair. However, when the Word of God permeates a society, it brings political and social change. Redemption brings lift. By preaching the gospel, we are changing the lives of individuals who in turn will change the country of Haiti.

On October 17th, I came to New England to speak in several churches along the east coast. Originally, it was planned that my wife Jeanne would accompany me. However, she insisted that she remain behind to support the team of missionaries while I was away.

I have spoken to Jeanne on the phone, she says that things at the mission are fine. The missionaries have rallied together and are working hard. Their spirits are high and they are fulfilling the call of God on their lives. Jeanne says that extra food has been distributed to the local people by our mission. On October 25th I will return to Haiti.

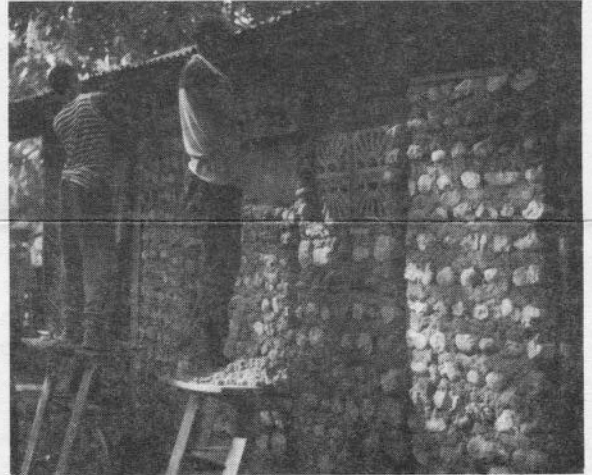

My wife Jeanne was touched by her need and asked if we couldn't put a concrete floor in her home. Several hundred dollars was raised, mostly from our mission team. Instead of just doing the floor an entire concrete house was built for her Jesus said, "When you've done it to the least of these, you've done it unto me."

POLITICAL UPDATE

A delegation from the organization of American States has met with representatives of Haiti interim government to seek a solution to Haiti's political problems. The country is divided over Jean Bertrand Aristide. Some people want him to return to Haiti and resume the presidency. Others, especially the military and upper class do not want him to return.

Additional meetings are being planned with the O.A.S. and Haiti's interim government. The two hundred years for Haiti's history since independence in 1804 have been turbulent. Democracy is new in Haiti and needs time to take hold. The country is quiet and everyone waits for some resolution.

MISSIONARIES REMAIN

The United States government has issued a request that all nonessential Americans leave Haiti. For several reasons, we at NEW Missions have chosen to stay in Haiti.

1. The Haitian people have indicated they want us to remain and be with them especially at this time.
2. The children of our mission are being fed and depend upon us for food and necessities.
3. Our clinic is fully functioning.
4. NEW Missions is isolated and surrounded by friends.
5. We are on the mission of God. We do not want to be foolhardy nor do we fear. Our lives are in His hands. We are here to serve the Lord.

MISSIONARY OFFERINGS

The offerings at our Friday night English service are being designated to purchase land for Pastor Guy Fontaine. Pastor Guy is a Haitian living in the capital city of Port-au-Prince. He has worked with us since the beginning of the mission. He is the Pastor of the church at Bord Mer. For years, Pastor Guy has commuted to and from Port. It will greatly enhance his ministry to have a home in the vicinity of NEW Missions. A small parcel of land will be purchased and the mission will assist him in building his home.

MISSIONARY NEWS

MICHELLE DEJONG - Michelle worked 12 weeks in the mission office doing school administration work. She is from the First Christian Reformed Church in Artesia, California. It was a pleasure to have Michelle with us.

RACHEL MYERS - Rachel worked 4 weeks in the clinic assisting in the prenatal and postnatal programs. She is from the Cornerstone Mennonite Fellowship in Broadway, Virginia. Rachel is a young woman who wants to serve the Lord. Our prayers are with her.

NANCY TUCCERO - Nancy arrived back in Haiti on November 20th for another term of service. She is from the Christian Assembly in Boston, Massachusetts. We welcome Nancy home to Haiti.

MISSION NEWS

- CHRISTMAS GIFT GIVING - Some Christmas gifts to the children have already arrived in Haiti. Our team of missionaries with Haitian assistants are busy every day calling children to receive their gifts. This is a happy time for everybody.


